- Work collaboratively and with consideration for others .'


During the term we have been so proud to witness the incredible generosity of our children, our families and our friends in so many different ways. The monetary generosity for our Poppy Appeal,

New technology present? Stay safe online

Some of our children may receive gifts of technology that link to the internet for Christmas, be it a new smartphone, tablet or games console. While their device will provide them with hours of entertainment, it can also present risks. ThinkUKnow, a leading e-Safety organisation, offers the following advice to make sure that our children are safe online over the Christmas period and beyond:

1. Set up parental controls

Parental controls can be a great tool to help protect young people online, and should be installed on any new device that the children use. See this Thinkuknow article.

2. Start a conversation with your children about communicating safely online

A new device enables young people to gain access to new communities through online gaming and social media. Remind them of some key strategies for safer internet use:

• Be careful with what the children share, including images, videos and personal information.

- Take control of who sees what they post by using privacy settings.
- Be mindful of who they are chatting to and gaming with do they really know and trust them? If not, don't share personal details or agree to meet them in other online spaces.

3. Remind young people how to report anything worrying

It's important that young people know where to go if they come across something online that worries them or makes them feel uncomfortable.

Talk the children through how they can use the school's <u>Whisper button</u> to report concerns and how to make a report to CEOP if something has happened to them online or they're worried about what a friend is doing online. The children can also contact <u>Childline</u> if they have any other worries or concerns.

We also encourage parents/carers to remember that **our focus shouldn't be to put young people off using their new device**. Scaremongering is not effective and makes young people far less likely to ask you for help if they encounter a threat online. Aim to provide a balanced view that encourages them to share their thoughts and engage with new ideas about staying safe. But also and probably most effective, is to join in with them: set up a family group they communicate with; learn how to play their online game; or get them to teach you how to use their new device. After all, they are often quicker and better at using them anyway! Thank you
